The support for our club in our darkest hour has been incredible. From our local, and broader community, and all levels of Life Saving there has been an overwhelming level of care shown to help us get through the immensely trying times since Easter Sunday.

On behalf of all our members I express our deepest gratitude to everyone who has helped out in some way, including the many, many messages of support.

The club also appreciates your patience and understanding during investigations into the incident over coming months.

To the rest of the year in review....

There has been a real positive feel around the club in general.

Brooke has done a great job at the head of a wonderful group of people who ensure the kids all have a ball over the ten weeks of Nippers.

With the financial help from Beach Energy we were able to send Under 13s, Under 15s and Under 18s off to Leadership and Development camps.

We also sent a group of Cadets up to Bondi Beach for a weekend of SLSA history and Patrol activities on one of Australia's most famous beaches.

It is my hope that that these programs give the Nippers something to aspire to, and will help retain more of our Junior members in the club.

The surf boat section grows stronger each year. It has been great to have Gary Askew come onboard to help sweep some of our crews. We even ran our own surf boat carnival in the bay. Voges will cover more of the boats in his report.

Darcy has done a great job again with Patrols and Special Events. I am pleased he will take on these roles again next year.

The swim series went really well again. Thank you again to all the members who pull together to make this happen.

We got a bunch of people trained and qualified in SRC, BM, IRBC, IRBD and 1st Aid.

Sean and Che qualified for, and worked as, paid Life Guards, on our beach and other Western district beaches on a Monday to Friday roster.

The Sunset room bookings have been steady through the year. Great work again by Maz, Marina and Sarah for making that very important side of the club continue to run smoothly and professionally.

After the Patrol Season finished Wal and his Port Campbell Construction lads got straight into helping with replacing the lintels along the front of the club. This has all come up great and gives the building a new lease of life. The cost of the work was covered by the Lifesaving Facility Urgent Maintenance Project.

Andrew has continued his great work to ensure all things financial are kept under close scrutiny, and on budget.

We were very fortunate to enter into a very beneficial three-year partnership with Beach Energy.

The success of the application to Beach Energy was largely due to the focus of the money being asked for going to junior member development and retention. As I mentioned it allowed many of our young members to go off to the excellent camps run by LSV, and a trip to Sydney for a group of kids at no cost to their families.

We were also able to purchase many new nipper boards, two new rowing machines and a new surf boat.

I look forward to seeing the next batch of juniors reap the benefits of the ongoing partnership with Beach over the coming two years.

This season showed how strong the club is travelling since its beginning 56 years ago. This is shown with the patrol roster being able to expand to 10 patrol groups from 9 groups the season prior. Also having 8 more junior patrol groups and then another 14 people on the active reserve and remote student list as reinforcements. This makes it easier for everyone, spreading the work load between more people.

Thank you again to all patrol captains and vice captains. You all make me job so much easier because you are all on top of your patrol groups. This season we have had 7 new captains and vice captains step up into these new roles. 6 of them are under 20 and are great role models for younger members.

Patrol audits returned this year and we did very well both times we had one. The first one we scored 970/1000 and the second time we scored 985/1000. These show the standard of training coming from our trainers and assessors. A credit to all!!

Now here's the fun part, the statistics! This season, we have almost tripled preventative actions for seasons prior to 102! Now that's a safe beach! We had one minor first aid, yep only one in 1978 hours of patrol time! Harry Howard had the most patrol hours with 51.5 hours to his name with Sean Lenehan hot on his tail (50.5 hours) and Guy Faber not too far away (45 hours). Lara Falk had the most for females with 43.5 hours.

As we all will be aware we have a new radio system. All the SES radios have been removed and replaced with brand new LSV owned radios.

I would like to thank VICSES for the use of their radios and transmitting frequencies that have served us so well for many years

I urge all members to familiarise themselves with our new radios. The operating procedures are explained in a print out on the wall in the tower. If you have trouble understanding the operation of these radios please ask your patrol captain or seek me out and we can go through their operation with you. These radios are very similar in operation to the ones we have had. Perhaps the major difference is that we can now talk direct to LSV comms. in Melbourne. These radios are owned by LSV but any damage to them becomes the responsibility of the club, so we must look after them and make sure they are in good operational condition at all times. Don't ever underestimate the value of reliable clear communications in everything we do.

ATV CO-ORDINATOR'S REPORT: David McKenzie

Our Can am has again proven to be a great asset to our club. It has taken the gut busting out of getting our watercraft onto and off the beach. I urge you to keep up the very high safety standard, all operators have demonstrated this year. Always remember the Can am is a high profile and potentially dangerous machine working in a confined and sometimes crowded environment, so always expect the unexpected. Keep up the good work. Remember only club inducted drivers are permitted to drive.

FIRST AID REPORT: Georgia Barnett

Well done to everyone throughout this last patrol season. Just a reminder for everyone for future seasons ahead to contact the first aid officer when anything has been used. It is also important to continue to log everything in the first aid logbook located in the first aid room, so that we have continual records of events.

With the patrol and nipper season finished up for the mean time, it is important to remember that the first aid room and the equipment located inside it are still available for use for those who are members of the surf club and have access to it. There are two public defibrillators located in Port Campbell, one being in the first aid room and the other located on the outside wall of the Port Campbell General Store. I strongly encourage everyone to access either of the two defibs if witnessing or attending to someone in cardiac arrest in the nearby area.

Early, effective CPR and defibrillation save lives.

GEAR STEWARD'S REPORT: Ian Harris

The Gear Steward's job is to make sure all equipment within the club is in working order throughout the season.

Another season passes by, as usual it was busy maintaining gear and equipment around the club. This was made easier by **Patrol Captains** and **Club Members** looking after equipment. Well done!

Gear inspection is a vital part of our club's year. This involves the First Aid equipment and room, IRB's, trailers, beach signage, radios, rescue tubes and rescue boards. Equipment has to be inspected and then tagged, by means of a sticker with the current year printed on it. If it is not safe to use, then it has to be repaired and rechecked. I would like to thank Scott McKenzie, Darcy Tribe, Sam Delaney (First Aid Officer), David McKenzie, James Green, Murray Joiner and Jon McLeod for their continual help throughout the season.

With the purchase of softer rescue boards our old heavy fibre glass rescue boards are nearly obsolete. However, we still need to make sure that equipment is used appropriately by members according to their membership category and ensure they have been trained in the proper handling and care of equipment.

BOAT CAPTAIN'S REPORT: Andrew Vogels



Vic Champs 2019. Silver Medallists – Boat Team Relay

The season started off for the Boaties with our master's women's crew, the Kittens, travelling to Glenelg Beach in Adelaide for the World Life Saving Championships. In very ordinary conditions Bronwyn Rantall, Leonie Wallace, Brooke Barnewall, Tracey Heeps and Scott McKenzie (sweep) performed well in both masters and Reserve grade events. Overall this crew had a great season, winning a silver medal in the 180 division at the Victorian State Masters Titles.

As the weather began to warm up, two junior boys crews began to train and then compete at Victorian carnivals. One of these crews travelled to Elouera for the ASRL titles in February. They took on much more experienced crews and some large surf and gained valuable experience for next year.

A new women's reserve crew also began training this year. They competed at a few carnivals and the Vic Titles and with some new rowers and some winter training are looking forward to next year.

The reserve men were again swept by Maz. They had some good results during the year, just missing the finals at the Vic Titles.

At different times during the summer 15 girls also began their surfboat journey. Learning the basics on the ergos and in the boat when the bay was flat enough. They are looking forward to the next season when they can begin competing.

The summer held some key highlights for the Port Campbell Boaties: the first being the purchase of a new surfboat through our sponsorship with Beach Energy. The new boat was launched at our own beach on the 28th of February, with crews from Apollo Bay and Port Fairy coming along for a row and to help us celebrate.

Another highlight was the State Titles. Port Campbell won silver in the Team Relay with the reserve men, reserve/masters women and U19 boys teaming up to finish second behind Torquay. This was an awesome effort and shows the depth we are building through the Boaties at the club. The U19 Boys crew of Cam McKenzie, Tate Tregea-Copeland, Charlie Trotter, Brandon Barnett and Gary Askew (sweep) took home the silver medal in their event.

The third highlight was Port Campbell holding its own small carnival in December. It involved all Port Campbell boat crews and crews from Apollo Bay, Port Fairy and Ocean Grove in round robin handicapped racing. The focus was improving our skills and getting together for a drink and BBQ afterwards with our surf boat colleagues. The day was a great success. Looking forward, hopefully next summer we can send more crews to the ASRL and maybe make a return to the Aussies after a few years' absence.

The Youth Involvement Program (YIP's) is directed upon this issue and provides these junior members with the opportunity to explore a wide range of areas within our club that may not have been previously known. This program builds on the good work that volunteers are currently undertaking in Life Saving Clubs and allows youth members to work closely with committee members to deliver a holistic program, covering all aspects of club life and creating a sense of organisational commitment amongst these young members. Throughout the season Yipper's were always helping out in any way that they could, whether it was from performing general maintenance around the club, patrolling, participating in surf carnivals, fundraising events and various trainings. Many of these juniors were also involved in water safety each week, in which they devoted their time and effort in ensuring that Nippers remains the fun and educational foundation for surf and beach safety.

Congratulations to those junior members who continued with the program for the 2018/19 season.

JUNIOR CO-ORDINATOR'S REPORT: Brooke Barnewall

The Nippers program, starting on the last weekend of November and running 10 weeks until early February, continues to attract healthy numbers with 144 Nippers on the books for the 2018-2019 season.

Highlights for the season include:

- We had 25 new Nippers in the U7 age group, which was a big number
- We continue to have good numbers in the U14 age group
- New foamies (purchased with Beach Energy sponsorship) allowed us turnover some of the old waterlogged foamies. The new ones were used by Nippers at the Port Fairy carnival
- Nippers were given free pink vests for the season and a beach towel through Beach Energy sponsorship
- 33 Nippers participated at the Port Fairy 'Australia Day' Carnival
- Club Champs were successful with a good turnout.
- We had 36 Nippers gain their Competition Skills Evaluation (S Badge)
- We had a small contingent of Nippers compete at the Junior State Titles in Lorne – Tyra and Nate Sambell, Nathan Hallyburton, Jack Matthews, Daniel and Tom Ryan
- Tate Copeland stepped up as Age Manager for U13s. Matt Bowker joined as U12 Age Manager. Sharna Whitehand and Ash Tregea joined as Age Assistants.
- Jon McLeod ran a series of Skills Sessions on Wednesday nights which were well attended and valued by participants and parents
- We purchased new age group coloured flags and rashies for the Age Managers, making it easier to identify between Age Managers and water safety
- Fun nights banked \$1,117.80. BBQ banked \$4,164.50

Things to think about for next season include:

New sign in / out app launched by LSV early last season. This app records all Nipper details including preliminary assessments, Competition Skills Evaluation, attendance, contact details etc.

Possibility of purchasing some new fiberglass surf skis to replace the existing plastic ones

Water safety and succession planning for Age Managers – recruiting new parents to help out

Proposal to run a cadet's program for U15s and U16s. This would be every Saturday during Nippers program. Instead of doing lots of patrols, cadets turn up at 11 am to do water safety for Nippers. From



1pm, they do specific activities – pelican, trips to Crofts with blue boards, Point, Princetown estuary on surf skis. They can run a Movie Night and BBQ at the Twelve Apostles Plunge.

RESCUE CO-ORDINATOR'S REPORT: Brett Wallace

This season, talks continued with LSV and AMSAR about the new national regulations regarding search and rescue organisations and how this would affect our Coastal Rescue Service. Multiple meetings were called to discuss the issue with discussions focused largely on whether the club was exempt due to our belief we operated as an inshore (less than two nautical miles from the coast) operation. LSV and AMSAR expressed their desire for the operation to move into a larger craft and extend our range to 30 nautical miles - similar to that of a coast guard. Over the past 35 years of operations, all but one of our callouts have been inshore and PCSLSC believe the added burden of training for our limited volunteers would be both unachievable and unwarranted given the larger craft would weaken our inshore abilities. Following countless emails and

correspondence between Ross, LSV and AMSAR we were granted temporary exemptions from the new regulations while talks continued.

From a rescue perspective this season saw two reported callouts.

The first was an IRB search for two children who had not returned from a snorkeling trip at the western point of the Port Campbell bay. Both boys were located shortly afterwards when they returned to the pier.

As you all know, the second callout involved a swimmer in distress at the Sherbrooke River mouth on Easter Sunday. The result of this tragic rescue has been well documented.

All members involved during the operations on that fateful day should be extremely proud of their dedication and application during this incident. Unfortunately, Ross and Andy paid the ultimate price for their selfless actions and Fuzz was seriously injured.

Moving forward, the club has some big decisions to make with regards to the form of our continued service. There is no doubt our Coastal Rescue Service is vital for our coastline; this is reinforced by the multiple lives saved during rescues over the past 35 years.

Perfect Day for the 12 Apostle's Plunge 2019

This year's swim series was a great success again.

It was the year of passing the baton on to someone other than John Ryan as the primary 'systems expert' for entries, race results, and swim times.

Michael Artz from Warrnambool SLSC did a fantastic job introducing an entirely new system and coaching people through its use.

We were lucky with the weather for the three events and participant number were high

The 1.2km Port Fairy Moyneyana Ocean Swim was on January 5. There were 223 competitors, followed by another 49 jumping in for the short course swim. Johanna and Holly McKenzie were 4th and 6th respectively in the Junior Female category.

The 1.4km Warrnambool Tony Ryan Memorial Bay Swim on January 19 had 156 swimmers enjoy flat sunny conditions.

Sophie Thomas crossed the line first in 14:24, 22 seconds ahead of the first male swimmer. Our own super-fish Johanna McKenzie came in 5th in the Junior Female (10th female overall), with big sister Holly two places behind her. Jon McLeod was 6th in the Super Vet' category.

Our own 1.2km 12 Apostle Plunge was on February 3.

Sophie Thomas was the first of 177 across the line, a mere 2 seconds ahead of series rival Sebastian Christie-Crane.

Jo and Holly were again separated by two places in 3rd and 5th Junior Female. Steph Hibburt and Shelby Gristede were 5th and 6th in open female. Mitch Gristede was 6th in open male, and it was great to see plenty of Port Campbell names in the overall list of entrants.

After the main swim 19 people jumped in and did the 500m shorter lap of the bay. Great to see them all participating and having a go at open water swimming.

Thank you very much to all those members who gave up their time once again to assist in making the swim series such a success. Particularly those who travelled to Port Fairy and Warrnambool to assist with their swim. Harry, Harry, Jon, Jo and Andrew thank you. A maintenance grant of \$20,000.00 from LSV and the state government has made this possible.

During the year members of the house committee met with a newly established branch of Parks Victoria to discuss our current commercial lease agreement. Ongoing talks will discuss increasing our current footprint to include the grassed area from the front of the club to the foreshore wall. Initial talks have been well received and will continue into next year.

These roles both require a great deal of time and effort and for that the club is forever indebted. Nipper Uniform

With the sponsorship from Beach Energy coming after the initial purchase of pink vests, through the early purchase deal, we have ended up with an excess of 'unbranded' pink vests. I will be looking to get these reprinted through the off season. We were able to supply 138 towels to our nipper participants as well as bright new safety vests. Our nipper/club skull caps were once again sourced through Thelma Hose, and I would like to acknowledge the support she has given the club for many years. We will have enough caps for next season, but will need to find a new supplier for the 20/21 season.

The Stewart Meek Most Passionate Club Member: This award is in memory of Life Member Stewart Meek. After some discussion it was decided to retire the "Holmes Best club person" cup and procure a new one in memory of Stewart Meek, as this is the highest award the club gives out and Stewart was held in such high regards by the club. *The award is awarded to the member with most votes conducted at the Annual Dinner by the club members.*

The John Younis Best Junior Club Person: The premier award to the Junior (U/18) club person in the PCSLSC commemorates the contribution of John Younis to the club. "Johnny" was the inaugural president of the club, a proud life member, and despite his claim to have never actually swum in the ocean; he became a strong and passionate advocate for the fledgling community group. Johnny was a man with big visions and while his early motivation centered on the provision of a rescue service in Port Campbell he became an advocate for the opportunities that the club could provide to young people. He was a great believer in the rewards that could come from effort and the award seeks to recognize those who have contributed in an outstanding manner. *The Club Captain chooses this award.*

The Ross and Andrew Powell Achievement Award: This award was previously called the Nita and George Powell Achievement Award but has now been altered (with the family's blessing) to recognise the significant contribution both Ross and Andrew Powell made to the Surf Club. The Powell family have always been aware that there were members of the Surf Club who, either by choice or the low-profile position they had in the club were silent achievers and thought those people needed to be recognized in some way for their efforts. *The Club Executive chooses this award.*

The Peter O'Rorke Power Boat Award: Peter was an active member of the Warrnambool Surf Lifesaving Club and was one of the key figures in the formation of the P.C.S.L.S.C. He was a role model, a mentor and a

life-long friend to many of these members. Peter spent many hours on the beach here training some 30 new members in the skills of lifesaving to attain their Bronze medallions. Peter always remained a staunch supporter of our Club and followed its development with pride and interest throughout the years. He held his Life Membership of our Club in very high regard. He was tragically killed in a car accident near Lake Bolac on 26th May 2010. His contribution to the P.C.S.L.S.C. should always be remembered. *The Club Executive chooses this award.*

The President's "Dunny Seat" Award: The President's Award is awarded to the club member who has displayed or performed an unusual (or in many cases, downright stupid) act during the year. *The Club President chooses this Award.*
