Nat has done an amazing job this year, striving to get us to refine, and use, systems that can make us an even better club. She led the way in developing an excellent club survey and getting enough member and community participation in the survey to give us a valid and valuable dataset to show how we are tracking on the many facets of being an all-ages, volunteer club in the emergency services space.

Nat has also been driving the comprehensive review of our club bylaws and I thank her for pushing this sometimes-tedious task along. The bylaws are a very important part of our club governance and were well overdue for a careful review.

Darcy has had a stellar year. After a nice long holiday, he came back with renewed energy to take on even

more tasks than the previous years. He basically single-handedly got the Peterborough patrol trial from concept to reality, despite having a number of Peterborough locals pull out of the training at the final hour. To bookend the season, he ran another bronze course to catch any Nipper parents and others who were keen to do it.

Darcy got the idea in his head that it might be nice to inaugurate an award in the McKenzie family name. A very thoughtful thing to do. And again, Darcy took it from concept to reality and the first presentation of this award will be at the 2023 Annual Dinner.

He and the Special Events Committee continued with another year of the swim raffle, raising a good deal of money for the Leukemia Foundation. He was also a key player in running the volleyball nights, the cadets walk at Princetown and generally continued to mentor all our younger members as a Club Captain I know they all look up to.

Darcy applied for, and was deservedly accepted into, the week-long National Leadership College in Sydney. This is a week-long intensive training course focused on guiding participants to find their own leadership style. The focus is for participants to develop skills and capabilities that will enable them to play a key role in the future of the surf lifesaving movement in Australia.

Darcy rounded out the season by assisting Sarah and Harry on taking 15 of our young members to Bondi for a weekend of lifesaving at the birthplace of SLSA.

One of the most important roles within our committee is the Junior Coordinator role. Yet it is often one of the hardest to fill. I really, really appreciate Tracey Heeps and Georgia Copeland, who together put their hand up to share that role this year, and they did a fantastic job. The role seems to become more involved every year, with various bureaucratic requirements and, having not done it before, Trace and Georgia were straight in at the deep end.

With Nat's help, they got a record number of kids signed up, paid up and participating in another fantastic season of Nippers. Much gratitude to everyone who helped run Nippers this year.

The House Committee has had another great year under Marina's leadership. Along with scheduling, chairing, and minuting the House Committee monthly meetings, Marina has had a really busy year in her role as Bookings Agent for the club's Sunset Room and Meeting Room. Post-COVID, the interest in both rooms as a go-to destination for all sorts of meetings, training and functions has gone through the roof. Marina has made sure all enquiries are promptly attended to and has universally provided fantastic customer service to anyone wishing to hire our facilities. She also stepped in to take on the cleaner role herself when our previous cleaner departed. Thank you, Marina.

A big thank you to the Club Executive, Bec, Nat and Andrew. These three shoulder a fair burden of responsibility in ensuring the good and correct governance of our club and I really appreciate the time they have to spend on club matters that their busy lives often don't readily allow for. It does not go unnoticed.

There are of course many, many other names I have not mentioned here, or I would take up half the report. That is not to say that any of you are less important to the club than those I have mentioned. I hope that as you read through the various sections in this Annual Report you take a moment to reflect on how many hours members have voluntarily given to ensure the ongoing success of our club.

We were successful in our applications for the two-for-one VESEP (Victorian Emergency Services Equipment Program) grant for a club vehicle. Our contribution of funds came from Beach Energy. The vehicle is a great asset for the club and has already saved 7,000km worth of travel on our members' private vehicles by towing the surfboat to Perth and back for the Aussies. A vehicle policy has been developed to provide guidance to what club activities the vehicle can be used for.

We lost a dear friend and Life Member, Jon McLeod, in December. That hurt. It hurt a lot. It still does. It was universally agreed that a nice, and fitting, way to honour Jon would be to name our annual ocean swim in his honour. The Jon McLeod Memorial 12 Apostles Plunge will be a wonderful way to remember Jon every year now.

We enjoyed another year of financial support thanks to our ongoing partnership with Beach. All our young people who were selected to attend the various Membership & Leadership Development camps. The kids who did the Sydney trip. The Junior rowing crews. The Nippers. All were able to offset the cost of their various activities thanks to Beach. We owe them, and our many other sponsors, much thanks.

It has been a privilege to serve as President for another year of a club that is the envy of many larger clubs around the state and country.

I look forward to doing a bit of reminiscing later in the year when we mark 60 years since the formation of our wonderful organisation, the Port Campbell Surf Life Saving Club inc.


A big thank you to all committee members who have dedicated countless hours attending, preparing, and following up on decisions coming out of these meetings.

Club survey

This year we conducted a survey of members and the wider community for the club to:


- gain a better understanding of what is important,
- recognise areas in the club that are working well,
- identify areas for improvement.

The survey attracted strong participation, with 230 individual responses from current members, former members, and community participants.



Nippers & lifesaving have the highest participation at the club.

Overall, the results offered very strong feedback that the club is doing a great job with our offerings and efforts to engage members and the wider community. Questions around club activities & programs, volunteering experiences, facilities & equipment and communications & social engagements all evoked strong ratings in good to excellent.



All club programs rated well, with nippers and lifesaving programs rating the highest.

Areas for possible improvement were identified through the number of neutral ratings, rather than poor or very poor. This is a great result, indicating that these areas may require tweaking rather than radical change.

From here, the committee have formed a strategic planning working group and will be using these findings, along with previous planning documents and other resources, to refresh our strategic plan over the coming season.

Bylaw review

Another project underway is the review and update of our club's bylaws. With a few review meetings already under our belt and a few more to go, it's certainly been a big exercise but very worthwhile.

Membership report

Membership remains healthy within the club, with a total of 431 people signing up for the 2022/23 season. This continues an upward trend in membership year on year across all but one category (active 15-18 years).


This growth is largely driven by junior membership (cadets and junior activity members) which peaked at just over 200 this season. This is a testament to the club's nipper and cadet programs, which attract strong participation and high satisfaction ratings from members and the wider community.

With only approximately 440 permanent residents in the township of Port Campbell, our members travel from all corners of the Corangamite Shire – and as far as Warrnambool, Colac, Geelong and Melbourne – to participate in club activities.

Our relatively new Community Member category enables the club to offer bronze medallion training (for a fee) for community members who aren't able to meet the patrol requirements of an active member. This year we helped 11 teachers from Ballarat & Clarendon College and the Alpine School gain their bronze medallion.

Club Captain report

The flags come down for another season. What a season it's been. First a thank you to our amazing patrollers, patrol captains and water safety volunteers who again made the season flow so well. Without all of you we wouldn't have the quality service we offer.

It was the longest season we have ever had running from late November until ANZAC day. There have been some big patrol hours put into patrol this season. This is shown on page 12 with our top patrol hours. A true credit to all involved for continuing to contribute with our quality service. There's a lot to cover from this season and here's a quick overview.

Peak season

Boxing Day was a very busy day on patrol with four board rescues in the bay within a couple of hours. It was the perfect storm for an incident, it a nice sunny

day, busiest time of year, big waves, and surging waters. The following day, on 27 December, there was an oxygen therapy incident for a lady who took in water while playing in the waves. Patrol was also extended by an extra hour for both these heightened risk days. Well done to all involved over that busy period.

Peterborough patrol

Peterborough got its own trial outpost patrol this season. A Peterborough community session was held in September which, combined with lots of advertising

on social media for new Peterborough patrollers, helped us achieve this trial. The patrol went for three days over the Australia Day long weekend.

Although the original idea was to patrol Peterborough on weekends and public holidays between Boxing Day until Australia day, we just didn't get enough new bronze holders to make it happen in that format. But we still were able to recruit quality new members in Ruth Mason and James Czencz.

Thank you to all involved who helped make it happen. We will continue to build the Peterborough patrol next season, so keep spreading the word that we need more Peterborough patrollers.

Pink patrol

Pink Patrol was another successful day this season, with a 20-strong, all-women patrol. The 20 patrollers cost the club president lunch for all of the patrollers, after losing his own wager.

The patrol was followed by a function at Grassroots, celebrating PCSLSC women's contribution to our club from past to present. Thank you to Steph Hibburt for taking the pink patrol on this year and to all involved who helped contribute to the \$2000 raised for the Leukaemia Foundation, by selling flavoured pink milks after the swim raffle.

Rescue Coordinator report

It is a positive sign of a safe season when there is little to convey in the Rescue Coordinator's report. There was only one incident for the season, and we had limited involvement.

With the absence of a larger craft and the discontinuation of the Coastal Rescue Service, the club role in marine rescue is continually evolving.

Local marine rescue was limited to two missing divers at Wreck Beach in the one incident in early May. The club was called on to simply offer support to Water Police Victoria and liaise with Life Saving Victoria (LSV) in the deployment of the drone to aid in the search. Unfortunately, the search remained unresolved with one man found deceased and the other still missing.

Talks continue with the Warrnambool Coast Guard with the aim to provide first response rescue capabilities in Port Campbell. Currently the nearest organisations are the Apollo Bay and Warrnambool Coastguard. Response times are lengthy due to their locality, especially in rough conditions for incidents in our area.

Beyond the surf club, there are many locals with the experience and skills to add great value to this proposal. Should this idea gather momentum, this service would not have any affiliation with our club or LSV. At this stage, we are simply investigating the options and using our experience and contacts within Marine Search and Rescue (MSAR) to assist if possible.

Warrnambool Coastguard is a highly professional organisation, and I would like to thank their members,

in particular Alan Wood, for continuing discussions and providing support. Hopefully, a few of us can get across to Warrnambool at some stage to investigate further.

Whilst the Coastal Rescue Service has ceased operating, the club is still on standby to be involved in any local incidents that may arise in our area. IRBs and personnel may still be called on via LSV Rescue Command. Any involvement will be assessed by the club according to sea conditions and available members, and assistance will be provided where possible.

LSV is currently developing a new incident call out system. Our local call out list will be updated shortly and circulated to members.

David completed his bronze in the inaugural Port Campbell bronze squad in 1963. David has served many different roles, including trainer, assessor, radio officer and important community role model. Marie has been equally as important in our community, being kind, supportive and patient. David and Marie have influenced their family to be major contributors to PCSLSC and the broader community. David has set a good standard to be alert and never take your eyes off the water while on patrol. This award is awarded to a club member to recognise their outstanding service of volunteer patrolling throughout the season. The

winner has demonstrated strong leadership skills, been a positive role model and high integrity.

This award was unveiled on 12 March 2023, to all three generations of the McKenzie Family on a patrol that day together. David was on patrol with his four children and nine grandchildren.

This award is chosen by the Club Captain and President and ratified by McKenzie family member.

The John Younis Best Junior Club Person

The premier award to the Junior (U18) club person in the PCSLSC commemorates the contribution of John Younis to the club. 'Johnny' was the inaugural president of the club, a proud life member, and despite his claim to have never actually swum in the ocean, he became a strong and passionate advocate for the fledgling community group. This award was previously called the Nita and George Powell Achievement Award but has now been altered (with the family's blessing) to recognise the significant contribution both Ross and Andrew Powell made to the Surf Club.
